

# **\*UPDATE #2\* Missing Swimmers Located during Search Operation- South Bowers Beach**

**South Bowers Beach**— On June 30, 2020, at 2:59 p.m., the Delaware State Police responded to the Murderkill River/South Bowers area for a report of two swimmers that had been carried away by the strong water currents.

The investigation revealed 21-year-old Kevin George Jr. of Philadelphia, his brother, 20-year-old Zion George of Tennessee, a 20-year-old female from Philadelphia, and a 20-year-old male from Philadelphia all traveled to the South Bowers Beach area together for a day trip at approximately 2:00 p.m.

The three males entered the water in the Delaware Bay to go swimming during low tide conditions. As they were in the water, the tide changed, and the strong current pulled all three into the Murderkill River. During this time, the Assistant Chief of South Bowers Beach Fire Department Michael Hignutt and his cousin, Timothy Smith, were fishing in the area and heard cries for help. Both Hignutt and Smith entered the water in an attempt to rescue the swimmers. Hignutt successfully rescued the 20-year-old male to shore and discovered the female had now entered the water to try and save the other two individuals. The female was then pulled out by the current, and Hignutt successfully rescued her.

Kevin and Zion were unable to be located, and multiple police, fire departments, maritime, and Emergency Medical Service agencies responded to the scene and conducted a search and rescue operation. As of 9:00 p.m., the brothers were unable to be located, and the search efforts were suspended until 9:00 a.m. on July 1, 2020.

At approximately 9:00 a.m., the operation turned into a search and recovery mission for Kevin and Zion. At approximately 10:30 a.m., Kevin was located deceased in the Murderkill River in close proximity to where he was last seen. At 10:45 a.m., Zion was located deceased in the same general area.

# **DSP Colonel Nathaniel McQueen, Jr.'s retirement to become Secretary of the Department of Safety and Homeland Security**

*Dover, Delaware* – On July 1, 2020, Delaware State Police Superintendent Colonel Nathaniel McQueen, Jr. announced his retirement. He begins serving as the Secretary of the Department of Safety and Homeland Security July 13.

“Colonel McQueen dedicated nearly 32 years with the Delaware State Police and served with integrity to protect our communities and to keep Delawareans safe,” said Governor John C. Carney, Jr. “He has an ability to connect with folks on a personal level and was a strong leader as the head of DSP. Though Colonel McQueen is retiring as Superintendent, I’m pleased that he will serve our state as the Secretary of Safety and Homeland Security— especially as we continue

building trust between law enforcement and the communities they serve.”

Colonel McQueen is the second-longest-serving Superintendent in the agency’s history, having served as DSP Superintendent since December 20, 2012.

“It has been the honor and privilege of my life to serve as the 25<sup>th</sup> Colonel of the Delaware State Police. I have borne witness to the dedication, sacrifice, and courage exemplified by all members of the Delaware State Police family,” Colonel McQueen said. “Many of our accomplishments have been the direct result of the relationship with the community we serve. During these challenging times, the Delaware State Police is well-positioned to seize the opportunity to build upon its legacy of leadership and the progress of our state.”

Prior to joining the Delaware State Police in 1988, Colonel McQueen served as a Sergeant in the U.S. Marine Corps. Holding true to the motto, “Semper Fidelis,” Colonel McQueen has remained loyal to what has been best for the citizens of and visitors to Delaware, as well as what has been best for the agency’s men and women, about whom he cares deeply.

Also extremely important to Colonel McQueen is his family with whom he resides in Bear, DE: his wife Freda S. McQueen, his son Nathaniel McQueen III, and his daughter Nayla J. McQueen.

U.S. Congresswoman Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-Del.) celebrated Colonel McQueen’s place in history and his truly remarkable career. “I was honored to work with him years ago and proud to see him rise to become the first African American Superintendent of the State Police,” she said. “His character and leadership are a model for Delawareans, young and old alike.”

Prior to becoming Superintendent, Colonel McQueen served in many leadership roles, including patrol Sergeant, detective

Sergeant, Traffic Lieutenant, Criminal Lieutenant, Captain (Troop Commander) of Troops 9, 1, and 2. He promoted to the rank of Major for statewide operations, then New Castle County Operations, before being promoted to the rank of Colonel.

Delaware Department of Justice Chief of Staff Robert M. Coupe said he was honored to have served with Colonel McQueen in the Delaware State Police and as Secretary of Safety and Homeland Security. Coupe said, "Colonel McQueen's devoted service to our State, his vision for the future, commitment to progress and his steadfast leadership through challenging times stand as a solid example for all leaders to follow."

Lieutenant Colonel Melissa A. Zebley also described the honor of having served as a member of the DSP Executive Staff with Colonel McQueen. "His vision for enhancing our operational effectiveness, his tireless work ethic, and his unyielding commitment to serve our communities have been the hallmarks of his leadership," she elaborated. "The culmination of Colonel McQueen's success is not simply measured in operational achievements; rather it is best measured by his impact on our division's healthy culture and his commitment to the wellbeing and safety of its people."

**Colonel McQueen's achievements include many items of direct service to the Delaware community. His accomplishments focus on improving the efficiency of business processes to advance public safety, and building transparency and trust.**

From December 2012 through March 2020, Colonel McQueen's leadership has created tangible results to the citizens of Delaware. Those include:

- Reducing both robberies and burglaries 62%
- Reducing thefts (*excluding shoplifting*) 52%
- Reducing non-family aggravated assaults 26%
- Increasing proactive DUI arrests 19%. (*"Proactive" indicates the trooper halted the offense before the*

*operator caused a crash.)*

- Increasing proactive drug investigations 70%.
- Increasing robbery clearance rates between 15 and 20%.
- Increasing burglary and theft clearance rates by about 10%.

*(\*Clearance rates may change, as open investigations may be subsequently solved.\*)*

In large part, this effectiveness came from the 2014 implementation of the International Association of Chiefs of Police award-winning stratified policing model State Police Enhanced Analytical Response (SPEAR), launching SmartForce technology. Providing immediate statistical results to troopers and the community has led to more effective enforcement strategies, expedited investigations, reduced crime, and improved traffic safety. Aside from local impact and awards, these results have been noticed nationally.

The American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators named Colonel McQueen the 2019 Lifetime Achievement in Highway Safety award recipient in the law enforcement category. In 2019, the Center for Police Practice, Policy and Research recognized Colonel McQueen for implementing innovative strategies that brought change and improved policing, naming him the recipient of the 2019 Excellence in Policing Award. These national accolades signify many small, meaningful changes – all focused upon quality service to the public.

With so much good news to share, DSP made 90 days' worth of crime information publicly accessible around-the-clock through Crimemapping.com. Similarly, using WordPress and major social media platforms accelerated public information-sharing regarding crimes, crashes, trends, and wanted individuals. DSP became the first state police agency in the nation to use the social media platform Nextdoor.com to deliver direct messages to communities needing specific crime prevention reminders.

At Colonel McQueen's direction, each patrol troop began hosting public Year in Review sessions annually to make information-sharing more conversational. Additionally, when the new Troops 3 and 7 were constructed, each was designed with a community room to allow for public meetings and gatherings.

Building on legacy programs like the Citizens Police Academy and Trooper Youth Week, Colonel McQueen established the statewide Community Outreach Unit in 2015 to improve interpersonal connections with the community. Since that time, DSP expanded to offer:

- State Troopers Actively Reaching Students (STARS) for lunchtime chats with elementary students
- Backpack and school supply drives
- Halloween Trunk or Treat events
- Thanksgiving food drives
- Trooper Youth Program
- Community Café or Coffee with a Commander
- Honorary Troop Commander partnerships
- Focus groups to assess community needs
- Troopers teaching at the Delaware Technical and Community College Junior Police Academy.

Colonel McQueen has been dedicated to families and their needs. He spear-headed multiple donor-funded renovations at Camp Barnes, the police-managed 73-year-old free overnight youth camp. Camp Director Master Corporal J. Shawn Hatfield, praised the Superintendent's personal commitment, "Colonel McQueen attended every significant event or ceremony at the camp, and he was always supportive of everything we did at Camp Barnes."

In addition to relationship-based outreach operations, DSP implemented many tools and training for more efficient service in the Communications Section. Further, Colonel McQueen called for the analysis of troop 9-1-1 call volumes. This resulted in

realigning the service boundaries of Troops 3 and 9 to provide more expedient emergency call responses.

DSP recognized the need for more widespread knowledge to prevent and respond to active-shooter situations, training its first Violent Intruder Preparedness and Response facilitator in 2015. Since then, 20,000 Delawareans have become better equipped to safeguard the places they visit, businesses they patronize, schools they attend, and places they worship.

Throughout Colonel McQueen's term, law enforcement roles and perspectives shifted to better meet the needs of vulnerable populations. In 2014, semi-annual statewide crisis intervention training was added to help individuals experiencing life challenges, including mental and emotional disturbances. Implicit bias trainers were certified in 2017, and the concepts were then integrated into multiple aspects of recruit training. Further, in 2018, DSP launched training for all DSP personnel on recognizing and intervening in human trafficking, naming a statewide coordinator for such investigations. Further in 2019, DSP established a pilot program in partnership with the Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health to coordinate service for those impacted by substance abuse and mental health.

Colonel McQueen's administration revised multiple policies and procedures. These reflected recommendations of The President's Task Force 21<sup>st</sup> Century Policing Report, including completely rewriting the agency's policy on response to resistance.

During Colonel McQueen's leadership, troopers' training and equipment exponentially improved service to the state's emergency medical needs. In 2013, medical responder training was implemented with annual recertification. In 2019, every patrol trooper began carrying Naloxone, and each was issued a trauma kit. Over time, three much-safer Bell 429 twin-engine helicopters were put into service for medical evacuations and law enforcement operations.

The agency's growth required tight compliance with established national standards. DSP has been nationally reaccredited nine times by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, twice during Colonel McQueen's tenure, including Accreditation with Excellence in 2016. From 2017 to 2019 DSP earned specialized accreditation and awards from the Airborne Public Safety Association for law enforcement and search and rescue, the National Governor's Security Association, and the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration.

**Colonel McQueen's focus was not solely external. Many of his decisions improved staffing, leadership, employee safety, and the workplace environment.**

Colonel McQueen prioritized the agency's most important resource: its employees and their leadership training. During his watch, DSP hired 263 recruit troopers and 229 civilian employees, and promoted 120 troopers and 91 civilians to supervisory positions. Endorsing the internal Leadership Development Program, Colonel McQueen sponsored nine classes of 217 sworn graduates, as well as all five civilian classes (to date) of 107 graduates.

Adding to each employee's readiness to serve, scenario-based de-escalation training and active-shooter refresher training were mandated in 2018. Tourniquets were added to the trooper duty belt, along with several other changes to make the patrol uniform more functional. Other tools were also upgraded to help troopers better protect the public. Colonel McQueen established a full-time contingent of SORT (Special Operations Response Team) in 2018 to enhance timely responses to armed and high-risk emergencies and acquired the necessary vehicles for protection from gunfire.

Physical plant construction and renovations improved employee working conditions and safety. These included building two patrol troops and a Mounted Patrol Unit stable, adding electronic security access, cameras, a special unit annex,

perimeter fencing at multiple sites, LED lighting, and HVAC upgrades – including replacing the 20-year-old system at the Firearms Training Unit facility.

**Colonel McQueen's 32 year police career has included many facets of the agency's rich history. What is likely to be remembered most is his genuine concern for those he served and those with whom he worked.**

Delaware State Troopers Association President Lieutenant Thomas Brackin described Colonel McQueen's diplomacy. "One of his true strengths as a leader is his ability to never take our differences personally and always try to see the other perspective," he said.

During the agency's most trying times, Lieutenant Brackin said he saw Colonel McQueen's heart for those under his command. He specifically mentioned the agency's mourning of the murder of Corporal Stephen J. Ballard and the deaths of Master Corporal Richard E. Long, Jr., Sergeant Rodney H. Bond, Jr., and Master Corporal William F. Matt.

"I saw the anguish and honest emotion he felt for these heroes each and every time we attended a viewing, funeral, and memorial service," Brackin said. "While devastated personally by their loss, Colonel McQueen was able to help these troopers' family members and his State Police family, leading us all through those times with compassion and dignity."

Acting Director of the DSP Public Information Office Sergeant Darren Lester praised the Colonel for exemplifying the agency's core values. "Colonel McQueen is an extremely humble man who has always endeavored to do what is right and has remained virtuous in his career..."

As Superintendent, Colonel McQueen served on numerous boards and committees, including several executive councils. Their missions ranged from youth protection, criminal justice reform, combatting violence, domestic violence, and advisory

boards for Delaware Tech Community College and Wilmington University.

Colonel McQueen holds his Bachelor of Science in Behavioral Science from Wilmington University and earned his Master of Science in Social Work from Delaware State University. Colonel McQueen is a graduate of the 209<sup>th</sup> session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation National Academy, the FBI National Executive Institute, and the Anti-Defamation League Counterterrorism Training.

Colonel McQueen's love of country, state, and the people he serves will remain constant as he enters his next level of leadership. Lieutenant Colonel Zebley offered, "The men and women of the DSP wish Colonel McQueen continued success in his new role in public service."

**South Bowers Beach**— On June 30, 2020, at 2:59 p.m., the Delaware State Police responded to the Muderkill River/South Bowers area for two swimmers that had been carried away by the strong water currents.

Troopers learned a 21-year-old male from Philadelphia, a 20-year-old male from Tennessee, a 20-year-old female from Philadelphia, and a 20-year-old male from Philadelphia traveled to the South Bowers Beach area. All four subjects entered the water to go swimming when they were pulled away from shore by the strong currents.

When this occurred, an individual onshore observed the incident, entered the water on two different occasions, and safely rescued two swimmers back to shore.

Multiple police, fire, maritime, and EMS agencies responded and conducted search and rescue operations. As of 9:00 p.m., two of the swimmers were not located, and the search efforts were suspended until July 1, 2020, when they will begin again.

At this time, this case remains active and ongoing. The identities of the victims are being withheld at this time due to notification to next of kin.

## **Troopers Arrest Milton Man and Juvenile on Drug Related Charges – Milton**

**Milton-** The Delaware State Police have arrested 55-year-old **Calvin Wyatt** of Milton and a 15 year old juvenile of Milton on multiple drug related charges.

The incident occurred on Monday, June 29, 2020 at approximately 3:32 p.m. on the 28000 block of West Springside Dr., Milton. Troopers were conducting pro-active enforcement in a known high drug traffic area. During this time, Troopers stopped in front of a nuisance residence and observed a male running from the rear of the property. Troopers made contact with the 15 year old juvenile in the backyard of a nearby residence and discovered that he had outstanding warrants. Troopers conducted a search incident to arrest and located crack cocaine on his person. Troopers then responded back to the known drug property and took Wyatt into custody for continually allowing drug transactions to occur on his property.

Investigation led to the discovery of the following. The

following was located on the juvenile:

- Approximately .65 grams of Crack Cocaine
- Drug paraphernalia
- Undisclosed amount of cash (Under \$100 in suspected drug proceeds)

Wyatt and the juvenile were transported back to Troop 7 where they were charged with the following:

- Wyatt was charged with Maintaining a Drug Property (Felony)
- Juvenile was charged with Possession with Intent to Deliver a Controlled Substance (Felony), Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Criminal Trespass 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree, and Resisting Arrest.

Wyatt was arraigned before the Justice of the Peace Court and released on his own recognizance.

The juvenile was arraigned before the Justice of the Peace Court and committed to the Stevenson Center on \$4,600 secured bond.

# Troopers Arrest Milton Woman on Multiple Drug Charges – Milton

Troopers observed Davis walking down the roadway and attempted to make contact with her for outstanding capiases issued out of the Sussex County Superior Court. Investigation led to the discovery of the following:

- Approximately .85 grams of Crack Cocaine
- Drug paraphernalia

Davis was transported back to Troop 7 where she was charged with the following:

- Possession With Intent To Deliver a Controlled Substance
- Possession of Drug Paraphernalia (2 counts)

Davis was arraigned before the Justice of the Peace Court and released on \$5,200 unsecured bond.

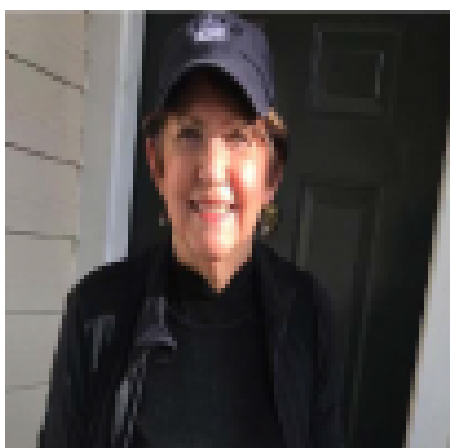

# Delaware State Police Homicide Unit Seeking Assistance with Locating Missing Person- Bethany Beach





**Bethany Beach, DE** – The Delaware State Police Homicide Unit is continuing to investigate the missing person report involving **Sheila Doyle**, 66, of Fairfax, Virginia. Sheila was last seen at her second residence in the Salt Pond section of Bethany Beach on June 15, 2020 at approximately 1:00 p.m. Sheila was in the company of her son Brian Doyle, 35, of Burke, Virginia.

At this point in the investigation, Sheila is believed to be deceased and Brian is the suspect in her death. Brian was found deceased on June 17, 2020 by the Fairfax County (VA) Police Department.

Sheila Doyle is 5'06", 130 lbs with brown hair. Sheila's vehicle, which has been recovered, is a black 2020 Buick Enclave with Virginia registration UKZ7235 (stock photo attached). Brian Doyle was 6'05", 250 lbs with brown hair worn in a buzzcut. The 8'x10' rug pictured below was missing from Sheila's residence in Bethany Beach.

Through investigative measures, it is known that Brian stopped in the following areas on the afternoon of June 16, 2020:

Primehook Road, east of Milton

US Route 113 in Milford

Middle Run Valley Nature Area, north of Newark

White Clay Creek State Park, north of Newark

# Troopers make arrests in Criminal Mischief incident – Wilmington

*Wilmington* – The Delaware State Police have arrested two individuals in connection with a criminal mischief incident that occurred on Naamans Road north of Wilmington, De. on Friday, June 26, 2020.

The incident began at approximately 10:12 p.m. involving a Trooper who was parked on the shoulder of Naamans Road. The Trooper was monitoring vehicles leaving the area after multiple reports of vehicles drag racing in the area. As the Trooper was seated inside his patrol vehicle, the Trooper heard a hard loud object strike the left side of his vehicle. Simultaneously, a black sedan with Pennsylvania Registration passed the Trooper at a high rate of speed. The Trooper activated the vehicles respective emergency equipment in an attempt to conduct a traffic stop on this black sedan. The black sedan failed to stop and sped off at a high rate of speed in an attempt to elude the Trooper. As the black sedan sped away in an attempt to flee, the black sedan committed multiple traffic violations, almost causing several traffic accidents. The black sedan then attempted to cross over a grassy median, but instead struck a DelDOT sign, causing the vehicle to become disabled.

Operating the black sedan was 21 year old Maliq A. Rollins of

Wilmington, De. Rollins was charged with one traffic related felony (**Disregard a Police Officer Signal**) and fifteen (15) other traffic violations.

A second passenger in the vehicle was a 20 year old male who was charged with Criminal Mischief (misdemeanor), littering and Possession of Alcohol by a Minor.

The patrol vehicle sustained approximately \$2,000.00 damage to the left side of the vehicle, causing dents requiring body work and new paint. It was determined the hard object that struck the patrol vehicle appeared to be a large glass bottle containing an unknown type of liquid. Neither the Trooper nor the two individuals arrested for this incident were injured.

Defendant Maliq A. Rollins (pictured) was arraigned in the Justice of the Peace Court and was released on unsecured bond. The passenger and second individual arrested for Criminal Mischief (misdemeanor), Possession of Alcohol by a Minor, and Littering was also arraigned in the Justice of the Peace Court and was also released on unsecured bond.

# **\*Update 3\* Troopers investigating Fatal Motorcycle Crash on Limestone Road – Stanton**

**Stanton**– The Delaware State Police are investigating a fatal motorcycle crash at the intersection of Limestone Road (SR 7) and Laura Drive that occurred on June 27, 2020, at approximately 12:19 p.m.

The Delaware State Police have identified the name of the motorcyclist who died in this crash as 22 year old Aaron N. Coleman of Wilmington, De.

# Troopers Attempting to Locate Newark Man Wanted for Felony Assault and Additional Charges - Newark

*Newark*— The Delaware State Police are seeking the public's assistance with locating 39-year-old **Alfred F. Zickgraf 3RD** of Newark, DE, who is wanted for felony assault and related charges stemming from a physical altercation on Tuesday, June 23, 2020.

At approximately 11:34 p.m., the Delaware State Police responded to CP's Pub located at 5 Polly Drummond Hill Shopping Center, Newark, for a reported assault. Upon arrival, Troopers discovered Zickgraf was a patron inside CP's Pub when he became involved in a physical altercation with a 23-year-old male victim from Wilmington. A 36-year-old male patron from Wilmington separated the fight, and Zickgraf exited the establishment and left the area in a car. Zickgraf then returned to CP's Pub, exited the vehicle with a large stick, and began yelling at people inside the Pub before swinging the stick and smashing the business's front window. The 36-year-old male from the initial incident exits the bar, and Zickgraf attempts to hit the subject with the large stick. The subject tackles Zickgraf to the ground, and Zickgraf removes a knife he had on his person and cut the individual in the face causing non-life threatening injuries. Zickgraf fled the scene

before police arrived.

Both victims refused medical treatment on scene for their injuries.

Troopers have been unable to locate Zickgraf who currently has active warrants out of Troop 6 for the following crimes:

- Assault 2nd Degree (felony)
- Assault 3rd Degree
- Criminal Mischief less than \$5,000
- Disorderly Conduct
